July Meeting Minutes

The regular meeting of the Hawthorn Chapter of Missouri Native Plant Society was held July 13 at the Unitarian Church in Columbia. Richard Guyette, dendrologist from the Missouri Tree Ring Lab gave a presentation on Acoustic Expression of Tree Growth. He has been assigning auditory tones to the width of tree rings, higher the pitch, the wider the growth ring as a result of faster growth during wetter years. These sequences are then played rapidly and create regular rhythmical expression of the changes in weather. We could hear the cycle of the drought and wet seasons. He is considering using tones produced from several different trees to arrange into an interesting 'musical' piece. The acoustic expression of tree rings can give us the sense of time, life and environment like few other organisms can. He is also looking for the 'Mozart' tree, one that could be played as a symphony.

Announcements: Hawthorn Chapter and Wild Ones will set up our booth at the Organic Gardening Workshop at Bradford Farm August 1 from 1 - 6pm. Becky will present a powerpoint and explanation on coordinating native plants with vegetables and crop plants to attract pollinators. Rock Bridge High School Rain Garden and Seed Collection Opportunity

For those of you that are not familiar with the Rock Bridge High School Rain Garden, it was a project of my Environmental Science classes, starting in the fall of 2006 and continuing through the spring of 2008. The school district had just completed a classroom addition to the Career Center adjacent to RBHS in the fall of 2005. This required the construction of an additional parking lot, which was placed on the northeast corner of the RBHS grounds. The engineers designed it with a storm water detention basin on the south side of the lot. Shortly after it was completed and already badly eroded, I scratched around for grant money to develop a constructed Rain Garden. I managed to get grant funds from the City of Columbia (which was an EPA pass through grant) and from MDC. Students in my classes were involved in planning and in planting over two years. Now, when students who were involved with the project return to visit their high school, they do remark about what a great experience it was, and swell just a little with pride about their unique addition to the school grounds.

Since completion of the Rain Garden in 2008, some science classes, as well as art classes have utilized the Rain Garden as an educational resource. Lea Langdon and I have been the primary caretakers, trying to stay ahead of the weeds and the invasives. On numerous occasions over the years, Master Naturalists, Gardeners, Americorps folks, and students from classes at Rock Bridge and the Career Center, as well as other service groups have provided maintenance help. As more classroom additions have been completed to the Career Center, more rain gardens/detention basins have been built to handle the storm water runoff at other locations around the complex.

At the present time there are five rain gardens on the Rock Bridge High School/Career Center campus. They all function pretty well, though some have gone without the weed/plant management that Lea and I have provided to the Rain Garden in the front of Rock Bridge. Go on out and take a look. Then wander around through the parking lots on the north side of the school and back to the baseball field, and you will see other rain gardens ripe for volunteer help.

Please feel free to harvest seed from the Rock Bridge High School Rain Garden in Columbia. As they mature, there is an abundance of Prairie Blazing Star, Prairie Dock, Grey-headed Coneflower, Slender Mountain Mint, Rose Mallow, Culver's Root, and Aromatic Aster. We don't need any more of these species, so help yourselves to the seed as they mature. Please leave all other species alone. The vast majority of these plants were from Missouri Wildflower Nursery and Prairie Hill Farm. If you feel so inclined, pull a weed or two as you harvest seed.
