
### Accomplishment of Member from Afar

#### Article submitted by Judy Turner

I want to share with ya'll my first submission to the Flora of Texas database. Photos attached. The Flora of Texas database is part of the University of Texas Herbarium Plant Resources Center. I was quite surprised when I was notified that my specimen had been accepted! The plant is *Pterocaulon virgatum*, common name Wand blackroot, a plant species widespread in Latin America and in the West Indies. In the United States, it has been reported only from Texas and Louisiana. It supposedly grows in marshy areas, ditches, sandy loam, etc. It took a friend, who is a self taught botanist, and I a month to determine the identification of this plant. I have now discovered at least 5 more of them growing on my property, which has no marshy area or even sandy loam. The soil here is mainly sand over red clay, with rocks thrown in for good measure! It is just now beginning to show its flower buds.

## Time to Plant!!

I heard a report on NPR that this July was Globally the hottest since records were started 130 years ago. I guess someone was good to us and left the refrigerator door open. [Everybody smile and sigh in relief.] When I worked at the NRCS PMC in Elsberry, the manager told me “You can plant 365 days of the year if you add enough water.”

This August and September has turned out to be a great time to add to your native garden or open up a new space. Temperatures are moderate so with a little added mulch and water, your new plants can get new roots imbedded before winter sets in. They will take off next spring just like the plants you have had for a few years.

Monarchs look for large spots of color for nectar; then they search out swamp milkweed. The egg-laying generation knows the new butterflies need nectar to fuel up for the journey south. Your Hawthorn Chapter Nursery has many prominent nectar species and over 200 milkweeds you can put in for monarchs and other pollinators next year. It is only 20 minutes from Columbia or Jefferson City. I have no inventory list, but I have about 60 species for most habitats.

Last week I asked for members to return pots and trays so I can re-use them. I received two times more plastic from other nurseries. Before you go a long distance to purchase plants at prices a dollar or two more than mine, please remember 100% of your money spent on plants goes to our educational grant fund for Columbia Public Schools and I am more centrally located than other nurseries.

Some people are buying from Box Stores and horticultural nurseries because they are convenient. ‘Convenience’ is not ecologically sound and can end up costing more in the long run. MOST Box Store plants are treated with systemic insecticides, they bloom at the wrong time, and they will cross out the wrong genes into wild populations.

Call me for directions and an appointment [we need to coordinate our lives]. Evenings after work and weekends are fine. 573-657-2314 I am in the paper phone book and the Petal Pusher masthead if you lose this. Call me soon!!




## Membership Meeting Monday, September 14th
